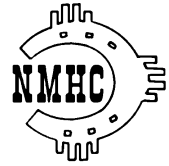

Our booth in front of the Horse Arena at the State Fair was very popular, and we continue to work with staff at Expo New Mexico to improve the horse shows.

We launched our Project Gelding in the summer and are seeking a few more stallion owners who need a little assistance in getting those animals gelded. Now is a perfect time for that surgery because the cold nights in most of the state have killed or decreased the fly population.

New Mexico State Fair 2013

Expo NM reports a 3.7% decrease in the number of paid admissions by people visiting the Fair over 2012, but point to four rainy days. Total attendance was 392,299 compared to 407, 265 in 2012, but the final Saturday this year set an all-time record. Revenues were not announced; the State Fair accounts for about a third of Expo New Mexico's annual revenue.

The Horse Council booth lacked visitors on the rainy days but many fairgoers stopped by when the weather was good. Unfortunately, our roofed stall was delivered to the wrong side of the Fairgrounds, and Expo staff was never available to move it; the "equine of the day" had to be content with an uncovered small pen. Horse show entry numbers have not been released, and no "post mortem" meeting or survey has been advertised – nor has the State Fair Commission met since January. We heard many compliments about Expo staff; however, as the Fair progressed we heard complaints as well. Members of the Board hope to meet with Expo staff to discuss and improve the premiums and shows. Shortly after Susana Martinez was elected governor, we wrote our first letter to her pleading for the hiring of a professional livestock event manager for the State Fair.

Trails and Land Use

Rio Grande Vision: Bosque comments from NMHC. Albuquerque Parks and Recreation officials are still sorting through comments on plans to "improve" the recreation experience. NMHC supports environmental monitoring prior to construction, and opposes the ten foot wide crusher fines trail in the Bosque. We do support





more signage, and perhaps benches near the access points.

Military Training in Cibola National Forest:

Kirtland AFB has requested a 20 year extension of the special use permit for training exercises in the Sandia, Mountainair, Magdalena and Mount Taylor ranger districts. The New Mexico Wilderness Alliance, Back Country Horsemen of NM, Sierra Club, NM Sportsmen and the Wilderness Society have asked the Forest Service to consider alternatives, such as limiting military training to the 5500 square miles of land in NM that they currently control. Once a FONSI, or "Finding of no Significant Impact", is issued the public will have 45 days to comment.

HUNT act now rolled into SPORT act. NM Senator Martin Heinrich has been pushing to open more public lands to hunters and recreational users, particularly those lands which have no access (for instance, are completely surrounded by private lands). The SPORT act, or "Sportsmen's and Public Outdoor Recreation Traditions Act", has bipartisan support. It would expand access to federal public lands, reauthorize some wildlife habitat programs, and divert 1.5% of the Land and Water Conservation Fund annually to purchase road and trail easements.

Limiting horses in Santa Fe County. John and Cat Parks of Trinity Ranch in Lamy are watching and opposing an effort by a few residents to (1) limit horses on property – no limits now exist; and (2) change the zoning of Equestrian Facilities from "permitted use" to "conditional use". It may be the usual sequence: move out to enjoy the rural atmosphere, only to find it includes animals. To keep current on the new "Santa Fe County Horse Coalition", which will oppose the proposed changes, email Cat Parks for information at thetrinityranch@gmail.com.

Manure an Asset? Dairy farmers in the "dairy cluster" near Roswell (and there are many of them) are working with the newly formed AGPower, a subsidiary of SID International Inc., a Houston biogas company, to convert dairy waste into CNG, compressed natural gas. The New Mexico Environmental Department is "supportive of this type of operation because it has good management of dairy waste and also addresses

some of the groundwater issues that are associated with the dairies."

New Mexico Racing

New Mexico's five racinos will have the following number of racing dates in 2014: (1) Sunland Park opens Dec. 6, 2013 and runs through April 15, 2014 – a total of 76 days; (2) SunRay Park will have 30 days from April 18 – June 22; Ruidoso Downs will race 60 dates, from May 23 through Sept. 1; Zia Park will have 56 days, from Sept. 6 through December 2. The Downs at Albuquerque





hosts two meets (including the State Fair), for a total of 52 dates from Aug. 2 to Oct. 26.

“50 to 1” tells the true story of Mine That Bird, the 2009 Kentucky Derby winner. We all know the story. The “biopic” was filmed in over thirty locations in New Mexico, and will have its world premiere at the KiMo theater in Albuquerque on March 19 (ahead of nationwide release March 21). **“50 to 1”** was directed by Jim Wilson (*Dances with Wolves*) who is a horse enthusiast, and stars Skeet Ulrich, Chris Kane, Todd Lowe and William Devane. And Calvin Borel plays himself.

Horse Trailers

Ask any ten horse owners in New Mexico if they need to license their horse trailers, and nine will probably say “no” because that’s how it used to be, and let’s face it, we are an aging population. I bought my two-horse Miley in 1973, five years after it was built, and did have a title and registration. Those records no longer existed in the NM Motor Vehicle Division computer, though the trailer itself remains useful after periodic reconditioning and sets of new tires.

Here’s what the MVD says: Chapter 13, Section A: “Most utility trailers are registered as trailers and receive regular trailer plates”; livestock trailers and horse trailers are included in a listing of utility trailers; “trailers exempt from registration include utility trailers *owned by individuals engaged in the business of farming and ranching*”; and “*used by individuals to transport animals to and from fairs, rodeos or other events, except racetracks, where the animals will participate or take place in the performance.*” (Italics are mine.) Although the MVD greeter said I probably wouldn’t get caught even if I lent the trailer to a friend, registration would be necessary if I wanted to sell it. I persevered; it took four office visits to enter the computer and get the plate, the final one following locating the VIN number and cleaning old paint out of the grooves so MVD officials could read it.

NM Horse Slaughter: Current

Friday, Nov. 1: District Court judge Christina Armijo in Albuquerque dismissed with prejudice the lawsuit filed by the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and others, which allowed

Valley Meats of Roswell to proceed with their plans to open a horse slaughter plant.

Monday, Nov. 4: Denver 10th Circuit Court of Appeals granted an emergency injunction to HSUS petition, which will bar the USDA from inspecting the Roswell plant as needed for the plant’s opening and operations.

Wednesday, Nov. 13: Year to date total of horses shipped from the US to Mexico for slaughter is 89,017 (USDA Market News).

Reconstituting the Quagga

The last known specimen died in a London zoo in 1870. The animal had zebra-like brown stripes on the head and neck, a reddish brown body, and white belly, legs and tail. The **Quagga Project**, after determining through DNA analysis that it was not a separate species of zebra but a subspecies of the Plains zebra, is attempting to retrieve the genes responsible for the Quagga’s characteristic striping pattern. Several generations later, they have foals with few stripes on the body, but have not achieved the dark background. These so-called “Rau Quaggas” may help in equine research on the attraction of tsetse flies to stripes versus solid color hides.

NM Horse Council Will Miss:

Glen Treseder. Glen passed away September 23. He, his wife Barbara, and their family loved, bred and showed the American Saddlebred Horses, and also supported the NM Horse Council and the American Saddlebred Horse Association of New Mexico. Glen and Barbara were a fixture at the State Fair for many years supporting their daughters Lori Treseder and Carri Hammond as they presented their brilliant, flashy horses.

Jean Rowe. Jean died November 6. She loved all animals, and when she decided she was too old to ride she became a “fixture” at the State Fair Horse Show Office, and also worked at many Arabian Horse Shows. That t-shirt All I Need to Know About Life I learned at an AHANM Horse Show? “*Jean may assign my number but Val knows when everyone’s number is up*” was one saying. Melanie Scholer designed it and Jean was proud to be a part of it. She and husband Walter supported the Council for many years.
